## Early Mankato Breweries: 1857 – 1890

Originally published in August and September 1985 by the Blue Earth County Historical Society

Information about early Mankato breweries is both meager and sketchy. Available dates of operation are frequently conflicting or approximate, and the spelling of the names of brewery owners often differ depending on the source.

Many of the owners of these early breweries were in and out of business in record time. It would seem that many brewery owners were in business to make money quickly. If this meant selling the plant for a profit, they did so. Other times, they seemed to become disenchanted when the profits were not readily available. They then disposed of the enterprise to the first available buyer.

Furthermore, in spite of the fact that early brewing business contributed considerably to the economy of early Mankato, writers of early Mankato accounts did not seem interested in such happenings. Therefore, few complete or accurate sources are available.

## BREWERIES Continued from page 1 1867

On March 2, 1867, *The Mankato Record* reported that a Mr. Welsch (also spelled Welch),

was constructing a brewery. Soon after, a beer garden was established near Welch's Brewery. On June 8, 1867, The Mankato Record reported: "Mr. Conrad J. Klein has purchased an acre from Lewis Branson in the timber near which he has

fitted up for a beer garden and erected a commodious dance hall. They will be open for visitors every Sunday and on holidays and the lovers of 'genial beverage' are cordially invited to visit the pleasant resort, the proprietor assuring the public that every effort will be made for their enjoyment and nothing of a disorderly character permitted."

#### 1868

In early 1868, Mankato was home to three breweries. These breweries were operated by William Bierbauer, Peter Welch, and Trout and Wolf. The largest of these was William Bierbauer's brewery, with the capacity to produce 100 barrels per week.

#### 1873-74

There were four breweries operating in Mankato from 1873-1874. At this time, the William Bierbauer Brewery was located on the end of Rock Street, the Hass and Schmidt Brewery was located in West Mankato, and the George Leiferman Brewery was also located in West Mankato. Interestingly, on an 1874 city map of Mankato, a section of property near the county bridge over the Blue Earth River is shown to be owned by C. Leiferman, and the 1871 Mankato City Directory listed C. Leiferman as a brewer. The relationship between these Leifermans is

speculative.

A fourth brewery had been previously established by Wolf and Trout and was now

owned by Peter Welch. It had several other owners until it was bought by William Gessler and John Nagle (also spelled Nagli) of Gessler and Company.

William
Gessler was born
in 1845 in Baden,
Germany. He
came to the
United States in
1865, and he was


employed in a brewery in Milwaukee. After doing the same work in Winona for a year, he came to Mankato. He continued working in the brewery business for three years and then bought a brewery of his own, the West Mankato Brewery. Gessler and Company continued to be listed in the Mankato City Directory through 1885-1886. However, the following article in the Mankato Review of March 13, 1883 gives this account:

"BREWERY BURNED. The brewery of Mess'rs Nagli and Gessler, near the Blue Earth River bridge, was burned about 2 o'clock on Tuesday morning last and as the flames spread with remarkable rapidity very little was saved from the conflagration. The origin of the fire is not known. One of the partners returned home about half past twelve o'clock and at that hour there was no fire in the stove in the saloon and there had been no fire under the boiler since noon on the previous day. There was insurance of \$1,000,00 with Christenson and Chapman's Agency on the furniture and brewing apparatus but none on the buildings, a policy for \$2,000.00 having been allowed to expire a short time previous."

This leads to the question, did Gessler and Company rebuild after the fire and continue in operation for the next four years? Notably, later this same year, Nagli and Gessler were charged with violating the internal revenue law and fined several hundred dollars for an unrelated incident.

#### 1878

Several breweries were operating in Mankato in 1878. Of course, one of these was the William Bierbauer Brewery located at 628 Rock Street. The Peter Welch Brewery, located near the Blue Earth River, was also still in operation. This brewery was leased to Joseph Ibach (also spelled Iback) on March 3, 1876. *The Mankato Record* of that date published this ad:



In 1878, Joseph Ibach bought a brewery in the southeast section of the city known as Tinkcom's Addition from Anton Jacoby. Who had purchased the brewery in 1876 from the original owner Carl Boekle.

However, it's important to note that contradictory or confusing information was sometimes given in local sources regarding the Mankato area breweries. For example, in the Mankato City Directory, the following information is provided on the Blue Earth Brewery:

- On page 78, the Blue Earth Brewery is listed as operated by William Gessler on Front Street in West Mankato.
- On page 4, the Blue Earth Brewery is listed as operated by the Gessler and Company located on South Front Street.
- In an advertisement, Joseph Ibach is listed as the proprietor of the Blue Earth Brewery, located in West Mankato.
- On page 21, Joseph Ibach was listed as operating a brewery at the Blue Earth River bridge.

This information leads to some questions:

 Were there two breweries in West Mankato operating at the same time by two different

- proprietors both named the Blue Earth Brewery?
- 2. Did Front Street continue as far south as the Blue Earth River bridge and intersect Blue Earth Street at the bridge so the two descriptions are actually the same place?
- 3. Were two breweries located in such close proximity?
- 4. Was the compiler of the 1878 directory in error about the name of one of the two breweries?


#### 1879

In 1879, John and Nicholas Graeber of Graeber (also spelled Graber) and Company purchased Peter Welch's brewery.

#### 1882

The June 1882 Mankato Free Press Special Edition contained this article: "Mankato has three of these industries which turn out thousands of gallons of beer and consume thousands of bushels of barley and other products. Probably one of the finest and largest of these outside of St. Paul is William Bierbauer's. Located upon the terrace back of the city, its commanding position makes a conspicuous object. But its dimensions and surroundings cannot be seen or appreciated except by visiting them. The buildings are of brick and stone, substantially built, and contain the very latest of modern improvements for manufacturing the foamy beverage. Large vaults cut in the solid

stone furnish receptacles for storing a year's product and warehouses for holding materials used are of huge dimensions. His residence opposite the factory is a large, roomy brick edifice. surrounded with a green lawn and arbor covered porch. Mr. Bierbauer is a successful businessman and highly esteemed

as a prominent citizen.

Gessler and Company are an old established firm in West Mankato, who turn out a large quantity of beer. Joseph Ibach is located in Tinkcom's Addition and has a substantial edifice suitable for his business."

Through the years, several breweries operated in West Mankato. It was an excellent choice for the location of a brewery, in that excavations in the limestone bluffs furnished spaces for vats for cooling, aging, and storing beer before electricity was available for refrigeration. The close proximity of the bridge over the Blue Earth River linked this area by road, not only to Mankato, but to south going traffic. The Blue Earth and Minnesota Rivers furnished water transportation for bringing in needed supplies and shipping out the finished product. The Chicago, St. Paul, Milwaukee and Omaha Railroad, which ran through West Mankato, furnished another avenue of transportation.

Between 1857 and 1890 there were the following breweries in Mankato:

- William Bierbauer Brewery (700 block of N. 6th and 628 Rock Street)
- Haas and Schmidt (West Mankato)

- George Leiferman (West Mankato)
- Stephen Lamm (West Mankato)
- Carl Boelke (Tinkcom's Addition)
- Anton Jacoby (Tinkcom's Addition)
- Wolf and Trout (West Mankato)
- Graeber and Company (West Mankato)
- William Gessler and Company (West Mankato)

There may have been others. Out of all these breweries which existed before 1890, only the William Bierbauer Brewery survived. More on that in the next installment.

The Blue Earth County Historical Society presents "Celebrating 100 Years of Lincoln School" a new History Center exhibit. The Historical Society, in partnership with Mankato Community Education and Mankato Area Public Schools (MAPS), is celebrating 100 years of Mankato's Lincoln School. The school opened in September 1922, so now is the perfect time to commemorate 100 years of the building, the people, and the memories.

"Celebrating 100 Years of Lincoln School" focuses on the relationship between the building and the community. BECHS views the building itself as an important artifact. The exhibit not only pays homage to the beautiful building and its past, but also honors the building today and its future.

Over the past 100 years, the historic Lincoln School has hosted countless school, social, and community events. The space has had languages of diverse cultures spoken and customs practiced. Lincoln opened as an elementary and

junior high school in 1922. The building transitioned to serve as Mankato High School for a decade before returning as a junior high. Did you know that the Lincoln Junior High School Comets had a team rouser?

In 1982, the building then became the home of Community

Education and known as Lincoln Community Center, where it continues to serve students of all ages.

The exhibit highlights this history through historic memorabilia, photos, stories, garments and also features most of the organizations that have called the building home.

We are excited to share so many stories from students, teachers and community members. We are grateful for the memories shared and objects loaned to us. We hope

## **EVERY OBJECT HAS A STORY...**

For our latest exhibit, "Celebrating 100 Years of Lincoln School", we have requested and have received a few items that will be here just for the duration of the exhibit. Here is just a glimpse of those objects now on display:

#### Wood-handle Brass Hand Bell, pre-1950



This handheld school bell is just over 8 1/2" tall by 4 9/16" wide and is quite loud. The handle is well-worn from use. There is a brass collar and cap. The bell is on loan from Donna Quick. She inherited the bell from her father, John J. Nelson, who was the Lincoln School principal from 1955-1981.

#### Beanie Hat, 1969

This is a red and white felt Beanie with "Lincoln" stitched on one panel. Colleges and universities across the country had beanie traditions. The hats were worn as a symbol of a freshmen, which distinguished them from upper classmates. This beanie was



given to the 9<sup>th</sup> grade students at Lincoln as a rite of passage of their last year at Lincoln Junior High School. This beanie was proudly worn by Donna Nelson and autographed by her classmates in 1969.

#### Flocked Aussie Hat, 2013

This marching band hat is from the Mankato Area 77 Lancers 2013 season. The Lancers started in the early 1970s as Mankato's community youth marching band based out of the Lincoln Community Center. It



has recently changed from a Community Education and Recreation program to a Mankato Area Public Schools (MAPS) activity, like sports or theater. In 2013, the Lancers took second place in the Vikingland Band Festival. The hat is on loan from MAPS.

There is still time to share your Lincoln School photographs and school memorabilia to be included in this very special anniversary exhibit at the History Center. Items will be on loan with BECHS until May 2023 and then returned to the lender. Don't miss this great opportunity to share your Lincoln School story. 

There will be Minnesota Department of Natural Resources study maps amid Marian Anderson art which will engage museum visitors to explore questions like "Can I see a loon on a lake in Blue Earth County?" Or "Where can I find loons in Minnesota?" Other maps will link the state map to information about red foxes and birds native to our state.

In January, the Discovery Lab theme will change from Harry Potter to Egyptology.

BECHS is partnering with the Blue Earth County Library to study the Pyramids of Egypt and Egyptology, as part of exploring the 1920s. The maps exploring Egypt, the Nile and surrounding nations will be available. Museum guests will enjoy puzzle problem solving with "Curse of the Mummy" themed escape room adventures. While many people associate 1920s with Jazz and the Great Gatsby, there was also the explorer-craze of archaeology during this time.

So much to see and explore in the Discovery Lab and through monthly hands-on history Young Historians workshops!

like to work within a historical society and the day-to-day work.

The overall theme of a historical society, from what I have witnessed, is that there is no theme. The daily work seemed to be something different each day. One day you might be providing research for an upcoming exhibit, the next day you could be helping a different staff member or even aiding in different events that change seemingly weekly. Sometimes projects will have higher importance due to when it needs to be accomplished or how much additional assistance they will be able to gather.

How does an exhibit for a museum pop up? This year, Blue Earth County Historical Society curated the exhibit "Celebrating 100 Years of Lincoln School." I was able to help answer that question firsthand. First, the museum decides the scope and context of the exhibit. This decides the who, when, and where of the exhibit. The next step answers the why and the how, which is accomplished through research and interacting with communities included in the overall theme of the exhibit. After the research, the goal is to gather as many physical artifacts as possible. Finally, the artifacts are arranged for viewing and the exhibit opens to the public to enjoy.

There are an abundance of opportunities and projects to explore, which make working with a historical society an interesting job.
