If These Walls Could Talk 811 South Second Street, Mankato

What has been known for over a hundred years as the Hunt House is located at 811 South Second Street in Mankato. It has been getting a lot of attention lately with a story on local television and an article in the Mankato Free Press. It has also been on the Lincoln Park historic house tour the last two years. In recent years the house has been looking pretty run down and seemed like a candidate for demolition and replacement, likely with an apartment building.

Fortunately for local history buffs and lovers of old structures, Chris Crowell and his wife Kristin Fisher have purchased the house and are turning it into a bed and breakfast. Despite ornate fireplace mantels previously having been ripped from the walls, some stamped metal ceiling tiles stolen and decades of deferred maintenance, the restoration process is currently in full swing with talented and dedicated craftsmen performing the work. The main floor will feature lots of historic items

accurate to the homes' early years, while the second floor bedrooms are having bathrooms added to accommodate a bed and breakfast.

The 1886 home is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is an ornate, unusual example of the Queen Anne style which is rendered in brick. It has picturesque massing that is dominated by projecting gable ends and a twostory round tower at the southwestern corner. There is also an impressive bay window with glass reportedly from the French Pavilion at the Chicago's World Fair from 1893.

We know the status of the Hunt House today, but now it is time to take a journey back 133years and discover who lived in this historic dwelling over the years.

The first owners and builders of the house were Lewis P. and Lisbeth (Lizzie) Hunt. A detailed history of the couple is featured in the Heritage of Blue Earth County. Lewis was born in 1854 in New York and his family moved to Iowa in 1863. In 1867, at the age of 13, he began learning the printers' trade and just two years later became foreman of a small county printing office in Earlville, Iowa. In 1874, he married Lisbeth Putnam in Iowa. They never had children. In 1880, Lewis went into business for himself in Lanesboro, Minnesota and was also in charge of several printing offices in Iowa and Illinois.

With this vast experience in the business, in 1881 Lewis purchased part interest in the Free Press in Mankato and a year later became the sole owner. In 1887, he organized the Free Press Printing Company and turned the weekly Free Press newspaper into a daily with himself being

the editor and general manager.

A year before this, Lewis and Lizzie built their house on Second Street where they would reside for over twenty years. While Lewis was making a name for himself, Lizzie was his support. According to a 1946 Mankato Free Press article by Lucy Pope Taylor, who grew up across the street from the Hunts, Lizzie was a most devoted wife. "Devoted to the nth degree to a husband of great personal charm, she waited on him hand and foot. She went with him everywhere and 'could go to Europe on five minutes notice'. She not only laid out his clothes, laundered his shirts just as he wanted them, but she put the studs and collar buttons in and tied his ties - even helped him in his bath." Lizzie once said that "Why sure, if I didn't wash his back, it wouldn't be done until the undertaker did it."

Lewis was lucky to have such a woman at his side. But Lizzie wasn't content to sit in the shadows. She proved to be an intellectual dynamo and a fine business person in her own right. Lizzie was the general contractor for the construction of four houses in the Lincoln Park neighborhood through the years. Lewis might have supplied the cash, but she was the ramrod for getting the houses built. Lizzie worked from 7

a.m. till 6 p.m. overseeing the workers. No one dared put anything over on her. According to Taylor, people were afraid of her and she enjoyed that. Wearing an old felt hat of her husband's and her hands crammed into the pockets of one of his discarded overcoats, she would stride up the alley or around the corner with an air of authority. But on the other hand, Taylor wrote, "In evening dress of

black lace or velvet, diamond earrings, thick natural waves of whitening hair and black eyes -[Lizzie] was beautiful."

In 1896, Lizzie was instrumental in forming the Mankato Art History Club along with Jennie Cordelia Andrews and Florence James, "three women with brilliant minds and an urge for selfimprovement." Besides meeting regularly to discuss art history, the group was civic-minded, arranging English language night classes for Syrians in Tinkomville (James Avenue area of Mankato) and making sure public schools practiced fire drills. The Mankato Art History Club is still active today.

Lizzie also encouraged an interest in art in the public schools and lead a fund drive with school children donating pennies to erect a statue of "Hiawatha" in bronze at Minnehaha Falls Park. Lizzie was also a member of the Minnesota State Horticultural Society and was a strong proponent for making the Showy Lady's Slipper Orchid the state flower of Minnesota. An early photo of the

Hunt House shows extensive landscaping around the property.

The 1900 US Federal Census shows

that in addition to Lewis and

Lizzie living in their house, a young female servant and Lizzie's mother resided there as well. The 1900 Mankato City Directory stated that Lewis Hunt was the owner of the Free Press Publishing Co. and editor of its daily newspaper as well as postmaster at the Mankato Post Office. At the age of 46, in the prime of his life, Lewis Hunt had two prestigious jobs, lived in one of the nicest homes in Mankato and was married to the talented Lizzie Hunt. Then in 1902, he sold his interest in the Free Press and resigned from being postmaster. He continued to live at his house and wrote occasional articles for the newspaper. In 1908 the Hunts moved to Alaska to run a canning factory with several other people from Mankato. This raised a few questions and a few eyebrows. Perhaps Lewis was just financially secure and ready to try something new after 30+ years in the publishing industry. Another curious thing is that in Thomas Hughes' 1909 History of Blue Earth County, Lewis Hunt is mentioned hardly at all, despite his very prominent role in Mankato's history. His brother Frank who purchased the Free Press from Lewis, has a full-page portrait and biography in the book.

The couple moved from Alaska to Seattle, Washington and it was there that Lizzie died in 1912 at 56 years of age. In the 1946 *Mankato Free Press* article, Taylor stated that Lewis was broken-hearted, utterly lost and desolate. He had never done anything without Lizzie. He simply didn't know how. When he came back to Mankato for a visit after her death, he looked at

Taylor with tears in his eyes and said "You know how much Lizzie meant to me." Lewis died in Seattle in 1922 at the age of 67.

In 1911, George and Agnes Atchison bought the former Hunt house. George dealt in real estate, doing extensive business in southern Minnesota. His obituary describes him as being a veteran in civic circles. He was a trustee of the First Presbyterian Church for 12 years, on the City Council, a director and active member of the Commercial Club and served several terms as the director of the Chamber of Commerce.

George was also responsible for the founding of the Mankato Fair Association and later was a member of the State Fair Board. When horseracing was popular in Mankato he was listed among several people who owned racehorses. At his funeral, friends from all parts of the state attended. The mortuary was unable to accommodate everyone inside and many remained outside during the service.

George and his wife Agnes were both born in Ireland. They lived in Mankato for 38 years until his death in 1934 at the age of 74. He and Agnes were wealthy enough to be able to have a live-in maid according to the 1920 Census. After George's death, Agnes moved to Des Moines, lowa to live with their only child, Mrs. Laverne Barlow, and two grandchildren.

The Hunt House entered a six-year period during which it was foreclosed on and was either vacant or had sporadic occupants. Finally in 1940 Henry and Betty Webb rented the house and a year later purchased it. For the next 75 years the

house stayed in the family. Betty was a hairstylist and had her beauty parlor on the main floor of the house. It was known as the Moulin Rouge Beauty Shop.

In 1974, Betty passed away and her daughter Cecelia Hanson bought the house. It was this year that the house was painted red and all the trim white. Cecelia continued running the beauty shop. Amazingly this business was in existence for over 60 years. I put a request out on "Mankato Memories" Facebook page seeking reminiscences of the Moulin Rouge Beauty Shop

and dozens of people responded positively. Here are just a few of the memories shared:

- * I had my hair done there the day before my wedding in 1954.
- * Cecelia cut my hair as a little girl and she did my Mom's hair every week.
- * My Mom went there for many years. Cecelia was a nice lady.
- * I went there with my Mom. I remember the beautiful woodwork. I loved that old house.
- It was a beautiful place in its day and Cel was a beautiful lady.
- * I remember having my hair put up with tiny rose buds when I was 4. I was in the wedding of Sue Heiser and Randy Wood. I still remember the day the bridesmaids and bride got their hair done.
- * I remember riding the bus to the "Castle House" so my Mom could get her hair frosted.

At one point, three generations of Hanson's lived in the house at once. The house was put on the market in 2015 and Cecelia died the next year at the age of 98. Developers bought it with the idea of perhaps tearing it down and putting up an apartment building. The City of Mankato was not keen on this idea as there were already apartment buildings on both sides and it would be too much population density for the area.

What will be the fate of this old house? In 2017, Chris Crowell and Kristin Fisher bought the house with the idea of bringing it back to its original glory and turning it into a bed and breakfast. I visited with them recently and their

The house undergoing renovations, 2019. historical integrity and yet making it a usable place for visitors to spend the night and enjoy a nice breakfast. They have some exciting ideas and yet are realistic about the obstacles they face. They are going to

call it "The Moulin Rouge House."

I've changed my driving route now and make

sure to go by the house to check on its progress. I really wish them luck. It is awesome that this 133-yearold home will continue be witness to stories and



EVERY OBJECT HAS A STORY...

In the Blue Earth County Historical Society's collections, we have objects that tell the stories of Blue Earth County's past. These objects are quite diverse, with only about ten percent of the collection on display at any given time. Here is a glimpse at some of our strange and curious objects currently on display in the Museum:



Schostag Mill painting by Amy Ostegard Goodrich, 1922 According to Thomas Hughes's History of Blue Earth County, this Danville Mill was believed

by its owner, Gottlieb Schostag, to be haunted. The evil spirit left, but Schostag refused further entrance in to the gristmill for fear of things going awry again. It is said that the artist also felt an uneasiness about her subject matter.



Paving Brick, 1900s
Wooden paving bricks
like these were used on
most of the streets in
Mankato in the 1890s.
The wood was soaked in

creosote to make the blocks "waterproof" and prevent moisture from causing wood rot. By the 1960s most paving stones were removed from the city streets, but it is rumored that a few still exist in Mankato today.

Neck Yoke, 1880s



This yoke was brought from Norway by Gust Johnson.
Unlike most yokes we think of, this was used on people to pull or carry things, not oxen or horses.




