# A Tale of Two Good Thunders





The death of the wife of Chief Good Thunder as recorded in the November 13, 1909 Mankato Daily Review, brought forth information to clarify who the two Chief Good Thunders were, and their roles in area history.

Chief and Mrs. Good Thunder were Sioux Indians who probably had seen the village of Good Thunder on only one occasion, July 4, 1989, when they were the principal attraction at the christening of the village of Good Thunder. Chief Good Thunder had been the trustworthy scout of Henry Hastings Sibley. He demonstrated his loyalty to the whites by warning them of the Sioux Uprising in 1862. Mrs. Good Thunder had been the wife of a renegade chief who was executed at Mankato on December 26, 1862 with thirty-seven other Indians. She was later married to Good Thunder, and under the instruction of Bishop Whipple they became Christians and built a church called Saint Cornelia. During the July 4, 1889 celebration, Chief Good Thunder was honored in the rechristening of the village in honor of him.

There was another Indian chief also named Good Thunder. He was a Winnebago Indian for whom the village may have been originally named. During the days of the Winnebago Reservation, this Chief Good Thunder occupied the log buildings and fields which had constituted the homestead of Noble G. Root in Section 10 of Lyra Township of Blue Earth County. Here was an excellent ford of the Maple River which, after the

Chief, was called "Good Thunder Ford". During the years 1861-63 Chief Good Thunder and a few hundred braves occupied these bottomlands. They were a peaceful group and were in no way connected to the Sioux Uprising. The Winnebago tribe had formerly resided in Blue Earth County. Their lands were bought by the government and the tribe was moved in May, 1863 to Nebraska where Chief Good Thunder died. When the Wells Railroad was located in 1869-1870 the proprieters arranged to have a depot built and a town site platted near Good Thunder Ford.

So it would seem that two Indian chiefs named Good Thunder contributed to the naming of the village, each in a very different way: the Winnebago Good Thunder, who lived on the Winnebago Reservation near a ford on the Maple River which was named for him, and where later a town site was called Good Thunder; and the Sioux Good Thunder who was a faithful scout for General Sibley. It was in his honor that the village of Good Thunder was rechristened on July 4, 1889.
