WHAT IS THE BLUE EARTH COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY?

One of the misconceptions about our historical society is that it is a County agency. Another is that it is run by a permanent group of people. Both statements are incorrect. Actually, **you**, the members are the Blue Earth County Historical Society. This is the message we need to get before the public.

If a person enjoys history and wants to preserve historically significant items, join, and as a member you will be part of the Society. The Society or Association is run by a Board of Trustees and is made up of 18 citizens of Blue Earth County. Their terms of office are generally for three years. The duties of the trustees are:

- a. to transact the business of the association.
- to create committees and approve their plans of work.
- to prepare and submit yearly budgets for approval of the association..
- d. to approve routine bills within budget limits.
- e. to be responsible for the development of policies to carry out the purposes of the Society.

That last phrase, "to carry out the purposes of the Society", is worth review. The Blue Earth County Historical Society was incorporated on May 24, 1916 by 13 county citizens interested in the preservation of our history. Some of the names of the founders include Judge Lorin Cray, Attorney and historian Thomas Hughes, George Palmer of the Hubbard Mill, Dr. John W. Andrews and newspaper editor, Charles Wise. This group of citizens and the early members of the Society have left us a trust. . . to maintain the purposes of the Society. Just what have we been charged to do?

- a. to collect, preserve and publish materials relating to the history of Blue Earth County.
- to collect biographic sketches and portraits of its pioneers and prominent citizens.
- to record the settling of the County and the growth of its towns and institutions.
- d. to gather a museum of articles to illustrate the condition of settlement and the history of the County.

- e. to collect and maintain for public use, a library of books, maps, pamphlets, manuscripts on the local history.
- to provide for the marking and preservation of historical sites and buildings.

We have approximately 600 members. We will only be as strong as our membership. We need to grow and each of us has a part in assisting with the purpose of the Society. We need your assistance, both in financial support and in using your time and talents. Read through our purpose again. How can you help meet this purpose? Good progress has been made over the years. Let's dedicate 1992 toward making the Blue Earth County Historical Society better than ever!
