VOLUNTEERS MAKE IT HAPPEN AT THE SOCIETY

Can you imagine keeping track of over 11,000 artifacts and being able to tell the condition and location of each item at the will of a customer? That's just one of the responsibilities of Ken Knutson, Blue Earth County Historical Society volunteer. Ken, who's been with the Historical Society for over four years, does a variety of volunteer work, but storing and tracking historical artifacts are his main responsibilities.

Ken is one of a number of volunteers who helps keep the Historical Society functioning and running smoothly. Recommended by the Minnesota Action Valley Council late in 1988, Ken has been working hard toward the improvement of the Historical Society. His hard work and the work of all the volunteers has contributed greatly to the success of the Historical Society.



Ken is the go-to guy when it comes to the storage and recall of historical artifacts. When someone donates artifacts or other information to the Society, Ken has the responsibility of logging the items into the computer system and assigning location numbers to them for easy recall. But it's not as simple as punching a couple of keys on the computer; much preparation is needed to determine which of a number of categories the artifacts should fit into and where they should be stored. A thorough knowledge of the inventory system (which is more complex than one would think) and a certain amount of intuition are needed to assure easy access to the artifacts.

Once the items are received for donation to the Society they are immediately assigned to an inventory category. Some of the categories include Artifacts, Textiles, Uniforms, and Hats, among many more. Ken inputs all the necessary information, such as the donor, description of the donated items, inventory category, date, and condition of the items into the computer. From there, the computer automatically assigns the next location number according to which inventory category it was input under.

Ken then places the artifacts carefully into boxes making sure all related items are grouped together in their respective inventory category. The storage area consists of a series of shelves that are labeled for easy identification. The boxes

are placed on the shelves according to the computer's designation. Items which are too large to be boxed (stoves, bicycles and other large artifacts) are placed in rows directly on the floor. A grid system is used for these larger items and each artifact is then "zoned" and logged.

The advent of the personal computer and the Historical Society's integration of an easily accessible network system has revolutionized the storage process. Before the system existed, inventory procedures were a complicated mess of paperwork and vertical files. The recall of specific artifacts could often lead to a paper trail longer than the Northwest Pass. Computers have simplified the procedure and allowed for a more efficient means for storage and recall.

The information stored in the computer provides necessary details that are crucial to a successful storage system. With about 11,600 items in storage, the ability to recall specific information about those items in a matter of moments allows for precise determinations and allows Ken to "free up" his time for other tasks.

Ken also contributes significantly to other areas of the Historical Society. While directing storage procedures, he also helps out with various programs that are sponsored by the Historical Society such as "Ghosts From The Past." He also provides his expertise to the archives area and offers his experience to the often painstaking research that is performed.

on the many diverse subjects within the files of the Historical Society; the Society's own Jack of All Trades.

Volunteers are what make the Historical Society go and whose help we could not do without. When the Society moved to the Summit Center from the Hubbard House, Ken and other volunteers had the unenviable job of moving all of the artifacts and organizing them. It was a huge undertaking. Over a two year period the task was accomplished. Today the storage room and inventory system are major reasons why the Historical Society is run so efficiently.
