How It All Began: The Founder of Girl Scouts

Juliette Gordon Low

Girl Scouting in the United States was founded by a remarkable woman named Juliette Gordon Low. Back in the 1800's, Juliette Low was something of a revolutionary-not the kind who destroys, but the kind who creates. She was an environmentalist, a crusader, and the type of woman dedicated to the service of others.

Juliette was born on October 31, 1860 in Savannah Georgia. Just a few months before the start of the Civil War. Known to her family and friends as Daisy, she was a person with a strong sense of determination. Her hearing problem that later developed into almost total deafness never stopped her from pursuing her goals.

After many years of traveling she settled in Paris where she met Sir Robert Baden-Powell, an English general and war hero who founded the Boy Scout Movement.

In 1910, an association of Girl Guides was formed. This new movement appealed to Juliette and she started a group of her own in Scotland.

In 1912, she was eager to introduce the program to American girls. The first meeting of Girl Scouts was in Savannah on March 12, 1912. By World War I there were enough Girl Scouts in the United States to make a real contribution to the war effort.

In 1916 Juliette wrote her own handbook which made provision for an aviation badge - a time when aviation was in its infancy!

Juliette Low died on January 18, 1927. A few months later the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund was started to honor her vision of worldwide friendship. On March 12, the anniversary of the day when she formed the first troop of Girls Scouts in this country, Girl Scouts celebrate the Girl Scout birthday. The week in which March 12 falls is designated as Girls Scout Week.

Juliette has also been highly honored by the United States Government. During World War II, the government named a liberty ship after her. In 1948 a Juliette Gordon Low U.S. commemorative postage stamp was printed, and in 1973, her portrait was presented to the National Gallery in Washington, D.C. In 1974 Juliette was also honored by her own state of Georgia, when a bust of her was placed in the Georgia State Capital Hall of Fame. In 1983, Congress designated that a new government building in Savannah, Georgia be named after the founder of Girl Scouting. It is called the Juliette Gordon Low Federal Complex.

Juliette Low is remembered as a woman who worked for peace and goodwill. Her dream was to have young people make the world a friendly, peaceful place. She wanted young people to understand themselves and others. She wanted to give something special to the world, and that was Girl Scouting. In the final paragraph of her will, she wrote, "I leave and bequeath to my family my friendships, especially my beloved Girl Scouts." She never had any children of her own, but her "adopted family" of Girl Scouts numbered 167,925 at the time of her death. Today this "family has grown to more than three million members and every one of them owes a debt of gratitude to the woman who made it possible, Juliette Gordon Low.

The Red Jacket Mill and the Red Jacket Bridge

The Red Jacket Trestle was built in September 1874. It was a great engineering feat and was the crucial link in opening Southern Minnesota grain fields to the mills in Mankato and vicinity. A wooden bridge was built on the LeSueur River and was replaced by steel spans in 1901.
