Curatorial Notes

We have just installed an exhibit at Madison Lake so I would like to share a bit of Madison Lake's history.

Madison Lake began humbly as a resort, called Point Pleasant, located on the shores of Lake Madison. As early as the 1870's Lake Madison had been known as a popular place for hunting and fishing. In 1882, Jesse Barclay built a resort on Point Pleasant which drew visitors from all over the world. The area grew in popularity and population. A Point Pleasant townsite was platted in 1883, and later a Madison Lake townsite was plattted in 1885. The village of Madison Lake was incorporated in 1892, combining both townsites into one. Through the early years Madison Lake Some of the early grew. business include Madison Lake sawmill founded in 1888, in 1889, the Peoples State Bank and Allyn Brothers Store in 1885. The resort industry continued to grow also. In 1900, a second resort, Copanning, was built by Jesse Barclay. Copanning never gained the popularity of Point Pleasant

and in 1947 it was demolished.

One significant event in the history of Madison Lake was the fire of 1910. The fire destroyed much of Madison Lake and many thought that the town would not be rebuilt. The town rebounded from the near disaster and in the years following the fire grew into the Madison Lake we know today.

This year marks Madison Lake's Centennial. For the past 100 years Madison Lake has contributed to the development of Blue Earth County in many ways and will for many years.


YOUNG HISTORIANS

Quilt Collection

quilts The in the collection of the Blue Earth County Historical Society represent those which were used for everyday, although there are some exceptions. These quilts are made from cotton fabrics and are filled with a cotton batting. Some of the fabrics are from flour sacking. The designs of the majority of quilts are pieced with patterns using rectangles and triangles. Exceptions to the utilitarian style are two applique quilts with floral motifs and the crazy guilts made of satins and velvets and embroidered in lavish designs. One last quilt holds a place of honor in the collection: the official Blue Earth County quilt. Completed in 1983, the square quilt represents each township as they appear on a map.
