New Exhibits At Te Heritage Center

The Sacred Cirle of Life: Dakota and Ojibway People of Minnesota

The Sacred Circle of Life: Dakota and Ojibway People of Minnesota, a photographic exhibit on loan from the Minnesota Historical Society, evokes the cycle of family relationships in the Dakota and Ojibway Indian communities over a 60 year period. The exhibit opens on September 1 and continues until October 4.

The exhibit consists of 63 photographic portraits taken between 1870 and 1940. These pictures are arrange to suggest the sex and age roles within Indian families between husbands and wives, parents and children, young and old. Particular attention is given to the place of women within the culture. The "Sacred Circle" was assembled by two Indian Women, Nanetee and Tori Graves, as part of their summer internship at the Minnesota Historical Society in 1976. The exhibit reflects their perceptions of the Indian community. The wrote: "For us, the Sacred Circle of Life is continuous. The men are the providers and protectors. The elders share their wisdom and knowledge with the young upon whom are focused the expectations of the future. Thus the circle is completed."



<u>Little Boys Never Grow Up</u> Their Toys Just Get More Expensive

Gary Oney has been buying and collecting toy tractors since he was in the sixth grade. Oney calls himself only a novice in the tractor collection business. He has a collection of 94 tractors that is worth about \$3000.00. "I know guys that have three to four hundred of them. They have them displayed on shelves that run the full length of a wall," he said.

Oney's oldest piece is a 1926 scale model of the older two cylinder John Deere tractors. He believes it's worth about \$400.

The old saying. "Little boys never grow up, their toys just get more expensive," is just about the case with Oney. He explained that the tractors can run anywhere from one dollar to one hundred dollars. The price range depends on different sizes, age and the amount of detail on the model.

When Oney and his wife go anywhere that sells toy tractors the little boy in him comes out. Part of Oney's collection is on display at the Heritage Center through September 30.
