



## Licensing an Auto in 1908

In 1908 when you bought an automobile, let's say a Ford, Model "N" Runabout, for about \$600.00 you had to go see H.F. Leonard. He was the Notary Public and he issued auto licenses. The licenses cost \$2.00. One dollar was retained by Mr. Leonard for his services and the other half was paid to the treasury of the municipality.

Then, you could drive your automobile, but you had to remember to obey the speed limits. Eight miles an hour was the maximum in settled portions of any city or village with 4 mph in crossings. But, once out on the open road, 25 miles an hour was the acceptable speed. Of course, the roads were such that you wouldn't have wanted to go faster. Oh, but if you could afford to buy a Ford Model "K" Roadster for \$2,800, the license was still the same, two dollars.


## Meet Your Volunteer....Jo Schultz

She never forgot that kind words and a smile cost nothing, but are priceless treasures to the discouraged.


She did unto others as she would be done by, and now that old age has come to her and there is a halo of white hair about her head, she is loved and considered




## **Ghosts Have Another Successful Year**


















BECHS also operates the historic R.D. Hubbard House. Built in 1871 by Rensselaer D. Hubbard, founder of the Hubbard Milling Company, the elegant mansion and brick carriage house contains many displays and artifacts which are open to the public.

The Hubbard House is owned by the city of Mankato and has been operated by BECHS since 1938.




