Diners and Restaurants to Remember



How many different answers would I get if I asked, "what do you remember of your years in Blue Earth County?" The ages of the readers of this newsletter span the century. It would be safe to say four to five generations of memories. I think within those memories we would share a couple common ones -- the friends we've had and the places we went with those friends.

My job today is to see what brain cells I can revitalize. You know they're in there, sleeping, waiting for a spark. A word, a name, will trigger what is held inside—those friends, those places, a local hangout, a favorite diner or restaurant.

There have been hundreds of diners and restaurants in Blue Earth County over the past century. I'll write of a few--those I've heard of from members and friends of the Blue Earth County Historical Society and those from my own memories.

Point Pleasant, Madison Lake. This resort has celebrated its 100th anniversary. What better place to start our walk down memory lane. Built in 1882 by J. M. Barclay, this resort was a haven for local townspeople as well as people from as far away as

Chicago, Kansas City and Omaha. When it was sold

to the Sheppard family in 1930, the Sheppards brought to the resort an emphasis on quality restaurant fare.

The resort will be remembered for serving buffet-style

chicken dinners each Sunday, dances on the hardwood floors and spending time along the lakeshore of Madison Lake. Point Pleasant is still available for wedding receptions, banquets and holiday parties.


Rapidan Dam Store, Rapidan. George Nelson opened the Rapidan Dam Store in 1910 selling bait to anglers fishing along the banks of the Blue Earth River. Nelson owned the store from 1920 to 1937; Leila Lenhert owned and operated the store for six years. In 1972, Jim and Linda Hruska purchased the store from Al Sween. Jim claims, in the May 1999 Connect Business Magazine, that it's the oldest bait shop and café in southern Minnesota. What I know is that I'm in my forties now, have lived in Blue Earth County since I was five, and I've got to say the burgers are like no other in the County and the pie is the best I've ever tasted. Stop in for "the best dam burger" in Blue Earth County. Share memories of days gone by and don't forget to thank the Hruskas for keeping the place open to enjoy for 33 years.

Mankato Candy Kitchen, Mankato. Chris Zotalis opened the Mankato Candy Kitchen, located on South Front Street in Mankato, in the early 1900s. An elegant new soda fountain was installed in 1912. This iceless apparatus of handsome and elaborate design was constructed of German silver and polished white Italian marble. The back bar was supported by four large onyx columns with two small mirrors, one on each end, and a fourteen-foot mirror in the center. All were surrounded by art glass panels in the ends and an art glass scenic panel in the center. The fountain had the capability of dispensing twenty different flavors; special compartments were built for eight different crushed fresh fruits. Six men were able to work serving without interfering with each other. Hearing of places like this makes me wish I were born in an earlier time. How lucky are you who have memories of such a place.

Longbranch, Vernon Center. At the time of this writing I have little information on past restaurants in Vernon Center. One article I found states that "at one time the drug store in town housed a soda fountain; ice cream and sodas were served at small, round wooden tables. Customers sat in old-fashioned wire backed chairs with round wooden seats and twisted wire legs." A picture of the Longbranch was just above the article. I am making the assumption that the soda fountain was at one time in the Longbranch. Was it possibly owned

by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Halverson? Does any one out there know for sure? Let us know.

Wycoff's Oasis, Mankato. Clyde Wycoff opened his drive-in in 1931 when Mankato had a population of about 18,000. He found a wedge-shaped corner lot at the center of US Highway 169 and two state highways passing it from the west and south, with a city park just

a few blocks away. Wycoff started out by handling only root beer but soon found out that other soft drinks as well as ice cream, candy, hot roast beef sandwiches and cigarettes were also wanted commodities. And then there was music. Wycoff had a music stand built on top of the building. A three-piece orchestra played on the roof every night from eight until eleven o'clock and on Sunday afternoons. The Oasis was open until 1975.

Wagon Wheel Cafe, Mankato. Wally Haefner opened the Wagon Wheel in April, 1951. It was a time of enjoying Lawrence Welk and His Orchestra at the Kato Ballroom, Ronald Reagan in the theatre and dancing at the armory to the Six Fat Dutchmen. The menu started with chicken, a whole lot of chicken. Then over time other items were added. Nowadays, a person has a hard time choosing whether to have breakfast for lunch or lunch for breakfast. Wally sold the café to his son Kevin in 1982. Kevin has continued the family tradition of preparing food for a variety of customers, from students to businessmen and women, to retired folk enjoying a cup of coffee and conversation. Did I mention jukebox music in the booths? Don't miss stopping at 609 South Front Street for a nostalgic breakfast or lunch.

Uncle Rog's Original Old-Fashioned Popcorn Emporium, Mankato. Okay, so it's not a diner or

restaurant but this article can't be written without a word about the popcorn and doughnut stand that sat at the corner of Front and Jackson Streets in Mankato in the 70's. Owner, H. Roger Smith and doughnut maker, Leone Steck popped out-mouth watering treats to shoppers walking by on their way in busy downtown Mankato. Circus-type music played and the aroma of doughnuts cooking enticed you as you passed by. Who

could resist a bag of cinnamon 'n' sugar doughnuts? I know my friends and I never could.

Countryside Restaurant, Lake Crystal.

Ghalen and Rhonna Nilson opened the Countryside Restaurant in 1975. The menu included basic home cooking, burgers, beef commercials and a salad bar. Over the years they served many a worker and traveler. In late 1992 the Lakeview Restaurant, along highway 60 running through Lake Crystal, went up for sale. Its location became the

second home to the Countryside Restaurant in January of 1993. The restaurant operated for twenty plus years.

Uncle Albert's, Eagle Lake. In 1976, Bell's Café in Eagle Lake changed its name to Uncle Albert's. Al 'Rab' Anderson owned the café until Mark and Rolene Fromm purchased it from him in November 1993. It's been said, by Thom Chesney of the *MSU Reporter* in his article about the café in February 1990, "this town cafe is like a comfortable chair, once you sit down it's hard to get up and move on." I think his words remain true. There's a certain feeling sitting in this café, eating down-home cooking, savoring every bite of their homemade pie. It's a feeling that you belong even though you're from out of town. People smile back at you. I'll have a grilled cheese, an order of fries and don't forget the chocolate malt.

Lyn Del's Café, Mapleton. Del and Linda Henze purchased the café in October 1976; its former name was Bergy's Café. The café is located on Hwy 30 that runs east and west through town. The Hense's offer home cooked meals, a variety of homemade pies and fresh rolls. After nearly thirty years, you can still enjoy a great meal and conversation.

Jamie's Pub, Pemberton. Steve "Jamie" and Sheila Jamieson have owned the pub since 1983. They've kept it alive through a farm crisis, the drought of 1988


and the flood of 1993. Jamie's is the gathering place for local farmers of southern Blue Earth County. The Jamiesons have remodeled and expanded over their years of ownership to make the pub into a fine place to meet with friends for lunch, dinner or a beer, and don't forget their Friday night steak fry.

Cambria Bar & Grill, Cambria. LeRoy and Barb Hollander opened the Cambria Bar & Grill in the fall of 1983. Who would have thought that a small town could serve up "the meanest hamburgers" in the area? The Hollanders believed in giving their customers a meal. With new owners, Wayne and Brenda Thorson, in April of 1998, the name was changed to Preri Bach Grill and Saloon (Preri Bach means little prairie in Welsh). The owners and name changed but the famous Cambria burger remains the same. If you haven't tried one of these burgers and a plate of fries, make the drive to Cambria for a meal to remember.

Uptown Tavern, St. Clair. Troy and Kelly Zabel purchased the St. Clair Municipal Liquor Store on Main Street in St. Clair and renamed the facility Uptown Tavern in the fall of 1995. It took them just six days to transform the once dark bar into a bright place to stop for a bite to eat and a game of pool. Their menu started with pizzas but has grown to include burgers, fries and other hot foods.

Formerly Crane's, Garden City. Being a part of the Blue Earth County Historical Society has helped me to appreciate history again. Of all the places I have visited in the county I have got to say this place, Formerly Crane's, is at the top of my list for a must visit. In 1994, Don Crane sold Roxie Mell-Brandts his hardware store. I don't know if anyone imagined what she would make of it. Once a hardware store, now a coffee shop filled with antiques, photos and writings of the history of Garden City, graduation photos of some of Garden City alumni and much more. Everywhere you look, something trips a memory or two. An occasional movie on the side of the building is a treat when Roxie's got one scheduled. The coffee shop is operated by Roxie and by volunteers. Hours of operation are limited so call ahead. This is one not to miss.

Amboy Cottage Café, Amboy. Have you been to Amboy lately? What Lisa Durkee has done to a beaten




Amboy Cottage Cafe, 2004.

up, 72-year-old building that formerly housed a gas station is amazing. With funding from an inheritance, City and Small Business Administration loans, private funds and a First Cup of the Day Club, Lisa got the café opened in January 2001, just a year from the start of the project. The café offers cooking influenced by Lisa's European experiences, fresh herbs from her garden out behind the café and charm that is unmatched.

Thunder Bar & Restaurant, Good Thunder. As some of the readers of this article are aware, the Diner's Club of the Blue Earth County Historical Society has been traveling through the county eating at restaurants each town has to offer. I've taken pictures at each

restaurant of the front of the building, the inside of the building, and of the people that have shown up for the lunch. April 12, 2005 the Diner's Club visited the Thunder Bar & Restaurant in Good Thunder. For the first time in 14 restaurants, I was compelled to take a picture of the food.

Each plate served was breathtaking, then mouth watering, then filling. Not that the other restaurants of the county didn't offer wonderful food, they did. It was

just that for a place many of us had never been before, it was a place that no one should overlook. I wasn't able to get much of the history of the restaurant while we were there--too busy eating I think--nor can I find an article written about the place, but there were pictures on the wall. Part of the building was a bank at one time. The waitress had us in tears with her humor.

There are so many more restaurants to mention, old and new, closed and open, but I've run out of space and it's time to submit the article for printing. Hopefully, a word or a name has created a spark to revitalize those memories stored in your mind. If I've done that, keep those memories alive by sharing them with the next generation. Through the Research Center Door:

If you want to know if "X" marks the spot and you're using a key or legend you must be using the Blue Earth County Historical Society Map Collection. If you haven't been in recently we have:

- Plat Maps if you're searching for rural roots, the first plat map is from 1879
- Atlas and Gazetteers the 1895 has a complete name index
- County Maps the 1865 Blue Earth County map has townships like Fox Lake and Watonwan.
- City Maps an 1893 Mankato, 1941 Lake Crystal, and 1964 St. Clair
- Fire Insurance Maps all you need is a street address and you can find information about the structure. These maps were used to determine insurance premiums
 - Vegetation and Topographical Maps

Maps can be used for historical and genealogical research. You can find places that have all but vanished and yet appear on a map, like the plan map for Le Hillier in 1854.

Knowing where your ancestors lived at a particular time can give you a point of reference and help you locate other information like church, school, census, and cemetery records. All maps are treasure maps. So stop by and see what's new and ask me a question or two.

The Settlement and Founding of Mapleton

Laura Garlow, Mapleton

The town of Mapleton was first settled in the spring of 1856, and it was settled by Uriah Payne, Ira Annis, J. W. Sprague, James Cornell, Robert Taylor, and many other settlers. Mapleton was first named Shennan after Isaac Shennan. In 1870 it was called Mapleton Station. By 1878 the word Station was dropped from its name. Mapleton was named because the Maple River was nearby. And the Maple River received its name because of the large number of maple trees in the area.

The sport of curling became Mapleton's favorite game in 1856. The famous poet, Robert Burns, has been remembered for 130 years by celebrating Burns Night. The post office was established in 1857. In 1857 Jarvis P. Harrington taught the first school in his log house. The first steam mill was built in 1858.

They had the town partially built, but it was vacated in February of 1863. First, the blacksmith established his building in 1865-1866. In 1867, a new post office was built. The new schoolhouse was completed in 1869 and in 1878 it was sold and it became a church.

The first store was made in the fall of 1870. In September 1870, the first general store was finished. Mapleton's hotel was built in 1870. Mapleton also had an Opera House, but it was torn down in 1872.

The first election was held on March 19, 1878. The first newspaper was called the *Mapleton Messenger* and was started on June 13,1879. Private banking

began in March of 1869. However the bank failed in 1896.

The first fire engine that Mapleton purchased was in 1883. Mapleton at one time had a bowling alley. There used to be an event called the Mapleton Fair. The most important reason for the founding of Mapleton was the railroad. Roads were first made only of dirt. On February 8, 1896, Mapleton faced one of its worst fires. In 1896, an electric light plant was installed for the town.

On March 31, 1903, the First National Bank was organized. Mapleton's Carnegie Library opened in 1910. The Borchet Brothers Hardware Store was built in 1915. In 1916, Mapleton's first theater called the Ritz Theater was built.

Mapleton started in the 1800's. Mapleton is still an important town in Minnesota. As Mapleton continues to grow curling will still be an important part of Mapleton.

Ft. Le Hillier South Bend Township, Blue Earth County, Minnesota

I decided to write about the settlement and founding of Ft. Le Hillier in Southbend Township of Blue Earth County, because my grandparents live near where historians think Ft. Le Hillier was located.

On May 3, 2005 I went to my Grandma Schreyer's place. I brought my metal detector along to see if we could find any old metal near the Ft. LeHillier site. We took a hike through the woods and found a tin can, some barbed wire, and a pole. Then we hiked to the mounds on the vacant lot by my grandma's house but we didn't find any historic metal. After walking back to grandma's house she showed me some old history

books she had on Blue Earth County and Ft. Le Hillier and that's where I got my information for this essay.

Ft. Le Hillier is located in South Bend Township of Blue Earth County, Minnesota, near the intersection of County Highway 66 and County Highway 90.

The French were probably the first white men to explore what is now Blue Earth County. The French were great explorers and fur traders. Pierre Charles Le Sueur and his group of explorers were here as early 1683. He discovered what he thought was copper in the green colored clay found near the Blue Earth and Le Sueur Rivers. A Dakotah Medicine Man told Le Sueur about the clay. In 1701, Le Sueur took a sample of the clay back to France to have it tested but found that it did not contain any copper. Pierre Charles Le Sueur never returned to Minnesota but left a man named D'Eraque in charge of Ft. Le Hillier. Ft. Le Hillier was abandoned in 1702. Pierre Charles Le Sueur died in 1704 after contracting yellow fever.

There are stories of an ancient and magnificent cave in the area where the blue green clay was found but no cave has ever been found.

For about 150 years after Ft. Le Hillier was abandoned, what is now Blue Earth County remained in its beautiful natural way. The buffalo grazed, the deer bounded through the forests and the wolves howled in the valleys. Smoke rose from wigwams of the different Indian tribes that inhabited the area.

Except for an occasional surveyor or trapper or hunters wandering through the area, Blue Earth County, South Bend Township was not developed until about 1850 when the first steamboat passed the mouth of the Blue Earth River. At that time, this area was part of the Winnebago Indian Reservation from 1855 to 1863. Mr. John A.. Jones purchased the land after the area was opened for settlement. The land was covered with timber.

Mr. Arthur Mitchell later purchased the land from Mr. Jones. Mr. Mitchell cleared the land to be used for pasture. An interesting discovery was made by workers on Mr. Mitchell's farm in summer of 1907. They were digging for gravel in a large mound in Mr. Mitchell's pasture when they found 15-17 skeletons - without

skulls! The skeletons were all adult males. At that time, a Mankato historian, Mr. Thomas Hughes, said "that the skeletons were those of Dakotah (Sioux) who were killed in a battle with the Sac, Fox or Chippewa Indians and the victors had cut off the heads of the slain and bore them away on poles as trophies of the battle." This probably happened in the spring of 1702 right before Ft. Le Hillier was abandoned.

This area became of interest to the Daughters of the American Revolution group in 1926 because of the history of Pierre Charles Le Sueur and Ft. Le Hillier. They placed a historical stone marker near where they thought was the site of Ft. Le Hillier.





The Betsy-Tacy Society

The Betsy-Tacy Society is a non-profit, charitable group organized in 1990. Our mission is to promote and preserve Maud Hart Lovelace's books, to encourage their continued publication and distribution, and to restore historical literary landmarks in Mankato.

Maud Hart Lovelace was born in Mankato, Minnesota in 1892 and lived here until 1910. She wrote six adult novels and eighteen children's books. Maud is best known for her beloved series of Betsy-Tacy books, which to a great extent, depicts her childhood days in Mankato, the fictionalized "Deep Valley."

In 1995, the Betsy-Tacy Society purchased the childhood home of Maud's best friend, Bick Kenney (Tacy) at 332 Center Street. In 2001, the Society purchased Maud's (Betsy's) childhood home across the street at 333 Center Street. Renovations are on-going and are supported by the generous donations from our membership and the general public.

Tacy's House currently serves as the organization's headquarters. It is open to the public every Saturday afternoon from 1:00-3:00 pm. Books and short stories written by Maud Hart Lovelace, postcards, notecards, paper dolls, T-shirts, sweatshirts, Deep Valley afghans, tote bags, porcelain mugs, Victorian gifts, and much more are for sale to help support our restoration efforts. New this year are books written by BTS members and other Minnesota authors. Tours are available by appointment. We request a week's advance notice to allow us time to line up a tour guide. For appointments call 507-345-8103. Visit our website: www.betsy-tacysociety.org.

This spring, the BTS has been the recipient of two grants which have allowed us to continue work on Betsy's and Tacy's houses. The Mankato Area Foundation awarded the Society a grant to assist in completing the exterior siding and trim and to install an entry door at Tacy's House. We also received a grant from Thrivent Financial for Lutherans Mankato

Chapter to begin work on the restoration of the front porch of Betsy's House. Thrivent organized Join Hands Day in April, providing volunteers to help clean out Tacy's garage, remove paneling at Betsy's house and scrape and paint Betsy's garage. Ferguson Enterprises, Inc. donated a new energy efficient hot water heater and Paul Kvitek from Paul's Plumbing & Heating donated his time to install it in Tacy's house. Master Gardener Barb Lamson continues to work on the garden at Tacy's House and it looks beautiful. We are grateful to these and all the volunteers and organizations who continue to help and support us.

The BTS is host to a new *Meet the Author* program held at Tacy's House. In 2005, we have hosted book signings and author visits by various Minnesota authors, including John Rezmerski, John Koblas, Joan C. Graham, Fred Netz, Terri Peppe, and Becky Davis. On July 23rd author Claudia Mills from Colorado was our guest author.

Other BTS programs include open house parties for Valentine's Day, St. Patrick's Day with Jack McGowan and Easter. In May, we were involved with Bryce Stenzel in the dedication ceremony for the new Lincoln Park Historical Marker and hosted a program at the Elk's Nature Center with Dr. Louisa Smith presenting "Outside the City: Rasmussen Slough in 1912 viewed through the writings of Maud Hart Lovelace." In June, the Society partnered with BECHS for a Victorian Lawn Party held at Tacy's House and the Hubbard House. We offered guided tours by "Betsy" (Lydia Campbell), a program about 1900s fashions presented by Kelly and Allie Reuter, and delicious frozen custard provided by Culver's.

BTS held our Annual Meeting June 11th with a potluck lunch at Tacy's House. Artist and author Cheryl Harness donated a new painting to the Society and it was unveiled at the meeting. This new Victorian-style painting highlights high school-age Betsy, Tacy and Tib in the center. Beautiful detailing features Betsy, Tacy and Tib's houses, the Deep Valley High School, and several Hart family artifacts mentioned in the book series. Each Betsy-Tacy book title is incorporated within the painting. Prints will be reproduced and available for sale as a fundraiser. Watch for more details coming this fall.
