

Collections

The artifact collections increased by 490 pieces in 1983. Four major collections were received in addition to many other smaller (one to twenty items) donations:

Emmel Estate Collection	167 items
Sugden Collection	81 items
Bartsch Collection	53 items
Jefferson Collection	41 items

The majority of donations this year were additions to our clothing and textile collection.

The Archives collection increased by 589 pieces. The photo collection increased by 264 photos in 1983. The greatest number are from the Sugden, Emmel, Jefferson, and Nelson Collections. General Archive materials totaled 325. The largest donations are in the Wigley, Jefferson, Friday, Emmel, and Sugden Collections. In total, the Archives collections increased by 589 pieces.

The grand total of pieces added to the collections at the Museum is 1,079 for 1983.

(An aside from those totals - - A total of **at least** 3,237 catalog cards were typed to complete the process of accessioning all the pieces. The Artifact collection requires three cards on each item in order to be properly cross referenced. The Archives collection requirements vary as some items need numerous subject cards typed for best use.)



From the Director's Rolltop . . .

The year of 1984 has gotten off to a great beginning. It is hoped that the energy levels will be high to enable us to accomplish many things in the next months.

Work is continuing on the reorganization of the storage facilities and upgrading the collections care. Few people realize the amount of space that is required to properly store museum artifacts. Most pieces need "breathing space" and should not come in contact with other objects. Artifacts not made of the same type of material should not be stored together. (Metal or wood should not be kept in the same box as paper or cloth.) Special storage boxes are often needed to not only keep dust and dirt off items, but also reduce deterioration from acids. Temperature and humidity levels and their rate of change need to be considered also. The storage needs require special consideration in order to place artifacts in the best possible environment.

Due to these special considerations, the reorganization of storage has taken on an added dimension in 1984. The collection continues to grow and more space has been needed to create better storage areas. Because the collection is in need of more "growing space", two exhibit areas will be closed within the next few months. The area that is now the Nursery on the 2nd floor will soon be the office and workroom area for the artifact collection. The room that now houses the sleigh bed, dresser, and exhibit case will be used
