Facility Update

A total of \$175,000 was transferred to the Diocese of Winona on July 30, 1987. The Blue Earth County Historical Society contributed \$85,000 to the payment. The deed was registered at the Court House in the name of the Summit-Heritage Foundation as of August 6, 1987. This means that the residents of Blue Earth County are one step further toward our dream of a new museum and one step closer to the Hubbard House being returned to looking like a home. Although there is a lot of work to be done before the new facility will be opened, we should all be proud and excited about our future.
