Curation Notes

Ideally, an historical archives provides researchers with an environment conducive to quiet study and comtemplation; in the past the BECHS Archives provided visitors with such an environment. On December 16, however, all of that changed when building contractors began renovation for the future BECHS Archives Reading Room, Archives Office/Storage, and Conference Room. The quiet was superseded by the roar of power tools, the blast of music from radios, and the shouts of workmen's voices. Engineers, plumbers, electricians, carpenters, and other tradespeople began working alongside the researchers and Archives staff.

Everyone agrees that the inconvenience and noise is well worth bearing because the construction will provide the Society with a well-equipped, pleasant study area and an enlarged, environmentally-controlled storage facility for the Archives collection.

The Archives will remain open to the public at its regular hours throughout the construction period but may have to be closed for a couple days as we move furniture and materials into the new areas. We will publish any closing dates in the county's newspapers; if you plan to do research in the Archives during February or March you may call us for further information.

Lest anyone thinks that packing and moving artifacts, building construction and planning occupied all of the BECHS collections staff's time in 1988 we have compiled some statistics related to the collections' growth and use for the year.


A total of 550 artifacts from about 100 donors were added to the artifact collection; this is the largest number of artifacts added to the collection in one year since the 1930s.

The Society was very fortunate to receive from the Lake Crystal Area Historical Society a collection of artifacts from the Lake Crystal area not already represented in the county museum. Cataloging of that large collection continues and when completed, will increase the total figures for 1988. Another large collection, donated by Margaret Williams, consists of personal artifacts from the Williams, Hughes, Lloyd, and Roberts families from South Bend, Lake Crystal, Butternut Valley, and Judson areas.

Other 1988 acquisitions of special importance include the following: personal items which belonged to Susie Dyer Fletcher, an early Mankato State Normal School instructor and wife of L.G.M. Fletcher (Susan

Duane, donor); a surveying/engineering transit set constructed of oak and brass (Elmer Goodrich, donor); two dollhouses with furniture, 1900 and 1940 (Theora Jensen and Georgia Schultz, donors, respectively); Continental Can Company cans and lids (Alma Severson, donor); and 4 Dakota-style beaded leather items (William Wolford Ward, donor).

The Society received a micro-computer in March of 1988. In the following months the collections staff developed a computerized artifact collection management system and by the year's end had entered the records for nearly 1000 artifacts into the computer. The records for another 1500 artifacts were updated and readied for computerization.

The Society's Archives also continued to grow as 53 individuals contributed collections of research materials which ranged in size from single items to several boxes of manuscripts, books, and photographs. Significant among the new acquisitions are the St. Clair Creamery records (Mrs. Harlan Frank, donor); land and personal papers of prominent early Mankatoan, John T. Williams, (Howard Williams, donor); family history materials on the Austin family and two original letters written by Maud Hart Lovelace (Don Freeman, donor); a photographic portrait

of, and musical programs featuring Dr. Hiram J. Lloyd (Mildred Jones, donor); the 1900 & 1903 Lake Crystal High School yearbooks (Katherine Sveum, donor); and numerous maps and aerial photographs of Mankato and North Mankato (Dr. Bert Burns, donor).

Around 490 people from 25 states made use of the research materials in the Society's collection; that figure reflects only a slight drop in the number of researchers we served in 1986 and 1987 despite the fact the Archives was closed for a month and a half during the move to the new facility. The Archives staff also wrote 200 local history trivia questions featured on KTOE Radio's morning show.

So the work continues in the county's new Heritage Center and whether the person doing the job be a carpenter, a plumber, or a museum registrar, they are all working toward providing the people of this county with a better opportunity for understanding the past.

We continue to have a need for cardboard boxes with telescoping lids (paper supply boxes). If you have any to spare please bring them to the Heritage Center or call 345-5566.

Special Program
