Piecing Together your House's History - continued

One of the most valuable sources of pieces for your puzzle is photographs. Whether they are professional photos in archival collections of longestablished firms or libraries or simply snapshots in family albums, photographs will supply you with fascinating bits of personal and architectural information. Be on the lookout also for engravings, lithographs, drawings, and paintings.

Utility companies sometimes have collections of photographs of structures and streetscapes and records of initial hookups.

In addition to checking the more public records and information, you can mine many private sources for insight into the families and lifestyles of the former occupants of your home—diaries, letters, bills, account books, insurance policies, scrapbooks, and journals.

Another important source is oral tradition. Using a tape recorder, interview older neighbors or family members about a house or neighborhood. Corroborate this oral history by documentation.

As you find and assemble the pieces of your puzzle, don't forget the most obvious source of information: the building itself. Its architectural style can lead you to the period when it was built, especially if it can be compared with similar structures in the area. Look closely at original materials and construction techniques for information using nail chronology, dendrochronology (wood dating) and other scientific methods. Archeological investigations of the building and site also can aid your search.

If all this research sounds like a great deal of work, it is! But it can be fun too. Don't forget others who have toiled before you. You might be able to bypass some of the original research by checking with agencies such as the state historic preservation office, which has National (or state) Register of Historic Places nomination forms on buildings and districts in your state. Local landmark commissions have information on buildings and districts under their jurisdiction. Books, magazines, and pamphlets on local history will sometimes have material. Local historical societies and private preservation organizations often collect information on historic buildings.

Those who have done it all before you share their experiences in how-to-guides. A recent

general research guide is Houses and Homes: Exploring Their History, published in 1987 by the American Association of State and Local History in Nashville. The Birmingham, Ala. Historical Society published in 1988 the House Detective: A Guide to Researching Birmingham Buildings, geared to that area but an excellent example of the methods all house researchers can use.

Whether you pursue your house puzzle out of sheer curiosity or to help you restore or renovate it, keep one bit of advice in mind at the end: Pass it on. You likely will not be the last to live in your house, so make a copy of your findings to hand down to the next owners. And don't forget to give your library a copy, so the next puzzle solver can have a look at the product.




