
Blue Earth County Cemetery Project

The anchor of our culture Perceiving and preserving the historic house

The center's goals are modeled on those of the European Center for Historic Homes in Brussels, although the constitutions and bylaws of each institution are fundamentally dissimilar. The European center is more a "social" institution concerned with monumental residences. Its houses cover a broader historical spectrum than those of its American counterpart and are qualified by a more complex set of rules. While in America the private sector remains the driving force behind the preservation movement, in Europe — with the exception of Great Britain — government agencies carry out a much larger percentage of the preservation projects. My own experience in restoring the Villa Capra, known as the Rotonda, designed in the 16th century by the architect Andrea Palladio near Vicenza, Italy, was a tour-de-force that wound its way through the labyrinths of government bureaucracy, local regulation, and official ineptitude. The results of the restoration were positive, however, thanks to skillfull labor, alert professionals, and persistent and dedicated owners.

In Europe the definition of historic significance may vary greatly as a consequence of varied cultural backgrounds and should not be equated with a seemingly analogous American cultural scenario. The similarity one finds on both continents is that the preservation process is motivated by the same consciousness of the past

In America as well as in Europe the constant transformation of the social framework, with all its contingent social values and cultural meanings, has broadened immensely the role of preservation as a reference point for change. It is not that society rejects the new; it is that society is uncomfortable with it and is unsure of it. Preservation, therefore, is our ultimate reliable source of social and cultural values, the soothing element linking the old, which is liked and understood, the new, which is questioned, and the future of which we

are not sure. The historic house, among other historic constituents, is the cultural anchor of our society, the time dimension that bridges the past into the future. The historic house is memory, without which our cities and our countryside would suffer the emptiness of a barren continent.
